

A Message From Pastor Jihoon Lee

Beloved of God,

Spring is gently making its way to us once again. The signs are everywhere: grass growing faster than we can mow it, insects buzzing through the air, and dandelions beginning to burst from the ground. For many, dandelions are nothing more than stubborn weeds—unwelcome intruders in a manicured lawn. But to a child, dandelions are flowers—bright, cheerful, and perfect for a bouquet. Their value lies not in their classification but in the eyes of the one who beholds them.

It reminds me of something I once heard: "Weeds are simply plants we haven't yet found a use for." That statement carries a quiet, profound truth. What makes something unwanted? Why do we treasure a uniform lawn of green grass over a golden field of dandelions? Our rejection of dandelions says more about us—our preferences, our standards, our need for control—than it does about the plant itself. And I believe there's a spiritual lesson growing right alongside those so-called weeds.

Years ago, as I strolled across the seminary campus on a bright spring day, I listened to a gospel song titled "Dandelions." The song begins with a tender image: a young child picking dandelions and presenting them as a heartfelt bouquet to his mother. The mother, moved by love, proudly places them in a vase. The chorus captures the beauty of that moment:

"She sees love where anybody else would see weeds."

As the song continues, the lyrics shift to a prayer:

"Where do I fit in this puzzle? What good are these gifts? Not a martyr or a saint—scarcely can I struggle through. All that I have ever wanted was to give my best to You."

And the refrain echoes in a new way:

"Lord, search my heart—Dandelions. You see flowers in these weeds."



So often, we hesitate to act because we doubt whether our small gestures or imperfect offerings make any difference. We wonder if our words carry any weight or if our acts of service are truly meaningful. We see only weeds—imperfect, unremarkable, or inadequate.

But God sees differently. In our sincere efforts to serve, to love, to build up others, to make disciples and nurture faith, God sees something beautiful. God sees obedience. God sees faithfulness. God sees love—where others might only see weeds.

As Paul reminds us in 1 Corinthians 1:27–28, "God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong... so that no one may boast in the presence of God." What the world dismisses, God redeems and transforms.

In the kingdom of God, there are no weeds. Every one of us, with our quirks and imperfections, has something to offer. Whether young or old, active or limited by health or circumstance, your gifts matter. Your kindness matters. Your faithfulness matters. Do not be afraid of falling short, of not making headlines, or of giving your best and still seeing only dandelions. When offered in love, God sees flowers.

May you be encouraged this season to serve boldly, to love deeply, and to see beauty in unexpected places. And may you always remember: God sees flowers where others see weeds.
